... And why does it matter?

 Fundamental dimension for administrative simplification, enabling the interconnection and access to "authoritative data sources" towards the onceonly principle (semantics).

• A guiding instrument towards efficient, inclusive, accessible and timely **digitalisation** of public services, as proved by the pandemic.

• A lever on digital transformation and innovation in public sector, through jointly experimentation and implementation of innovative solutions, like GovTech.

- Provide guidance to public administrations on the **design and update** of national interoperability frameworks (NIFs), policies, strategies and guidelines.

- Cooperation with Member States through the CIO Network and Expert Group on Interoperability of European Public Services (exchange on good practices, advice on the implementation of public sector interoperability and policy development).

Strengthened EU interoperability policy: proposal for a regulation

Establish a strategic governance between EU public administrations (Member States, ClOs, experts) to work and support cross-border and cross-sector interoperability, with focus on:

- Co-ownership and co-creation of a catalogue of interoperability and reusable solutions
- Supporting joint experimentation and innovation initiatives amongst public sector entities, including with the private sector ("GovTech")
- Supporting EU policymaking that aims to be digital-ready and interoperable-by-design
